1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4 This Act may be cited as the "Comprehensive Alcohol
5 Regulatory Effectiveness (CARE) Act of 2010".
6 SECTION 2. PURPOSE.

It is the purpose of this Act to—

1	(1) recognize that alcohol is different from
2	other consumer products and that it should be regu-
3	lated effectively by the States according to the laws
4	thereof; and
5	(2) reaffirm and protect the primary authority
6	of States to regulate alcoholic beverages.
7	SEC. 3. SUPPORT FOR STATE ALCOHOL REGULATION.

11	known as the "Webb-Kenyon Act", is amended by adding

13	"SEC. 3. SUPPORT FOR STATE ALCOHOL REGULATION.
14	"(a) Declaration of Policy.—It is the policy of
15	Congress that each State or territory shall continue to
16	have the primary authority to regulate alcoholic beverages.
17	"(b) Construction of Congressional Si-
18	LENCE.—Silence on the part of Congress shall not be con-
19	strued to impose any barrier under Clause 3 of Section
20	8 of Article I of the Constitution (commonly referred to
21	as the 'Commerce Clause') to the regulation by a State

1	"(c) Presumption of Validity and Burden of
2	PROOF.—The following shall apply in any legal action
3	challenging, under the Commerce Clause or an Act of Con-
4	gress, a State or territory law regarding the regulation
5	of alcoholic beverages:
6	"(1) The State or territorial law shall be ac-
7	corded a strong presumption of validity.
8	"(2) The party challenging the State or terri-
9	torial law shall in all phases of any such legal action
10	bear the burden of proving its invalidity by clear and
11	convincing evidence.
12	"(3) Notwithstanding that the State or terri-
13	torial law may burden interstate commerce or may
14	be inconsistent with an Act of the Congress, the
15	State law shall be upheld unless the party chal-
16	lenging the State or territorial law establishes by
17	clear and convincing evidence that the law has no ef-
18	fect on the promotion of temperance, the establish-
19	ment or maintenance of orderly alcoholic beverage
20	markets, the collection of alcoholic beverage taxes,
21	the structure of the state alcoholic beverage distribu-
22	tion system, or the restriction of access to alcoholic
23	beverages by those under the legal drinking age.".
